Dear Mr. Pottash:

This letter responds to your recent Freedom of Information Act ("FOIA") request received by the Federal Communications Commission (the "FCC or "Commission") and assigned to the Consumer & Governmental Affairs ("CGB"), Enforcement ("EB"), and the Media ("MB") Bureaus. Your request seeks "Any document, or segment of document that mentions the 'Carrier IQ' cell phone application, and which was written before November 1st, 2011."

CGB conducted a search of the databases in which we maintain the records of informal complaints filed by, or on behalf of, consumers. Our search revealed 15 documents that are responsive to your request, which are enclosed. EB informed CGB that a search of its records identified no responsive documents.

Mr. Hennigan redacted all personal identifying information relating to the individuals who submitted or are named in the enclosed complaints or inquiries based on Exemption 6 of FOIA, which permits agencies not to disclose files that would clearly invade personal privacy.¹ Mr. Hennigan also redacted some FCC employee names based on Exemption 2 of FOIA, which permits agencies not to disclose internal personnel rules and practices.²

All personal identifying information relating to the individuals who submitted or are named in the enclosed complaints or inquiries has been redacted based on Exemption 6 of FOIA, which permits agencies not to disclose files that would clearly invade personal

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privacy.³ Some FCC employee names have also been redacted based on Exemption 2 of FOIA, which permits agencies not to disclose internal personnel rules and practices.⁴

The FCC receives many complaints and comments that do not involve violations of the Communications Act or any FCC rule or order. Thus, a complaint or comment does not necessarily indicate any wrongdoing by any individuals or entities named in the complaint or comment.

FOIA and FCC rules require the FCC to charge requesters for time spent searching for and reviewing responsive documents, and for copying them.⁵ Based on your classification as a representative of the "news media," you are responsible only for the payment of duplication costs beyond the first 100 pages. However, there are no charges associated with processing your request.

If you think this response denies your FOIA request, you may file an application for review of this decision with the FCC's Office of the General Counsel within 30 days.⁶ Both the application and envelope containing it must be marked "Review of Freedom of Information Action" and the application should refer to FOIA Control No. 2012-092.

To Whom It May Concern:

I am writing with regard to the recent findings of Mr. Trevor Eckhart with respect to the Carrier IQ software commonly embedded on phones and tablet computers. (A summary of his findings is available at <http://www.wired.com/threatlevel/2011/11/secret-software-logging-video/>), among other sources.) I personally use one such phone that has Carrier IQ software embedded on it which is serviced by Sprint. I am angry that secret software could be monitoring /anything/ that I do without me having been made aware of its existence and function and without having had the opportunity to preemptively opt out of this service used by Sprint. No mention of this service has ever been made to me by conversation I have had with a customer service representative or in any agreement that I have signed to my knowledge.

I request that the FCC investigate the matter of the inclusion of Carrier IQ software on wireless communications devices used by the public and that actions be taken to ensure telecommunications customers are a) made aware of its existence and /exact/ function on devices they use, b) have the option to opt out of this service at any time, and c) have public-usable tools at their disposal to verify whether or not such software is actively running or enabled on devices they use.

In short, anything less than a wireless provider making available public and comprehensive descriptions of the kind of information transmitted by a wireless telecommunications device used by the public is an invasion of user privacy in

the most fundamental sense. Americans have the right to their own privacy, and to choose which entities--corporate or otherwise--have access to which type of information about their daily lives. It is not difficult to imagine that a profile about a wireless customer could be prepared and archived using information such as keystrokes, URLs visited, and phone numbers dialed, and that such a profile could be used in nefarious ways. For many, the very idea that anyone or anything is recording such information is enough to dissuade them from accessing information through wireless devices for fear that something about them would be discovered or deduced (correctly or incorrectly) and could subsequently endanger their personal safety or enable others to profit at their expense. Simply choosing to not use a wireless telecommunications device in order to avoid such a situation is obviously not an acceptable alternative in today's society.

I am certain I will not be the only one contacting the FCC about this matter.

Thank you for your time and consideration of this serious matter.

I am writing to express my concern about the presence of a program called Carrier IQ on Android based smart cellphones. You can Google Carrier IQ for detailed reporting on this issue.

The basics are this, the program appears to log every keystroke that you make on your phone. The program is difficult to find, is not mentioned in any of the phone company's customer information, and is impossible for the average phone user to turn off or remove.

This software appears to be serious violation of customer privacy, and may

violate wiretapping laws. I would appreciate you looking into this as it is an issue that directly affects many US cellphone users. Both Carrier IQ and Sprint have been less than forthcoming about the software's data capture capabilities. I believe a direct inquiry to Carrier IQ and the major carriers from the FCC would be useful in shedding some much needed light on this matter.
